We want your time at Buffelsdrift to not only be the experience of a lifetime, but an experience that changes your life! Our aim is to empower ordinary people (like you!) to protect nature by creating a conservation lifestyle upon their return back home.

So what do we mean by a conservation lifestyle? A lasting change in heart, from selfish consumption towards preserving what has been entrusted to us.

The Buffelsdrift foundation is a starting point for you to become a conservationist because with your help there can be a better tomorrow. Our planet and



specifically the wildlife that abound on it, is a special gift that we have the luxury of experiencing and enjoying. We want to share that experience with you and more importantly we want future generations to have the opportunity to have similar enriching experiences. This can only be achieved through conscious consideration of our current actions and learning new ways to preserve and conserve our greatest gift.

Our conservation program could not function without the hard work, dedication and time of our volunteers. These volunteers are officially known by the government as voluntourists. By joining us at Buffelsdrift you are becoming part of a generous group of voluntourists. Funds from our volunteering programme are reinvested into conservation, enabling us to grow and become even more successful in achieving our vision.

What will I do?

Overview

You will have the opportunity to work with some of the most amazing wildlife species in Africa such as lions, rhinos, elephants, giraffes, cheetah, meerkats and many other indigenous species. The Day-to-day program incorporates our dedicated volunteers. You will also be part of vital research on wild meerkat families.

The daily program may include the following activities:

- Monitoring, cleaning and maintenance of lion and elephant enclosure
- Preparing food for elephants and lions
- Tracking and monitoring free roaming cheetahs
- Researching and observing wild meerkat families
- Performing game counts
- Electric fence and enclosure patrolling
- Setting up camera "traps" for research purposes
- Relocating/ trans-locating wild-life
- Mitigating human animal conflict
- Contributing to habitat conservation, including planting spekboom
- Community upliftment via local projects
- Assisting and support at local farm school
- Farming work such as maintaining water supply, fixing fences, etc.
- Ultimately learning to become a conservationist



Caring for wildlife and their habitat in Africa is not always easy and is faced with many challenges, but is one of the most rewarding and enriching experiences a person will ever have.

Typical day of a volunteer

Normally the working day starts at 08:00 and ends at 17:00. On Saturdays only essential activities are part of the program, followed by fun activities. There are usually four to six activities per day. Volunteers are free on Sundays giving them the opportunity to participate in Buffelsdrift Game Lodge activities or to explore the captivating Klein Karoo or the Garden Route. Volunteers are exposed to all activities as the program is based on a rotation system.

Free time

We are situated in an area where there are many opportunities for adventure and sight-seeing for volunteers to explore during their free time on weekends.

Adventures and activities in our area.

- Cango Caves

- Day at the beach or surfing (the closest beaches are at Mosselbay, Herolsdbay and Victoria Bay approximately 70 km travel distance)

Benefits of volunteering

Skills you will acquire and develop

- The proper use of telemetry tracking equipment
- The use of hand-held GPS devices
- How to identify wildlife species
- How to set up and use camera "traps" to monitor certain species
- How to track animals using traditional methods like the identification and following of animal spoor
- How to collect and analyse data
- An understanding of conservation and issues of human animal conflict

By taking on this volunteering challenge you will increase confidence in your unique ability to make a difference. You will gain leadership, teamwork and relationship skills. Learn about self-management and learn to apply your present skills more effectively.

You will enjoy the benefits of communal living, meet people of different walks of life and also get the opportunity to make long-life friends Ultimately we dream that you will gain a conservation mind-set.

The details

Requirements:

- Who can apply: Any person above the age of 18 years.
- Language requirement: We understand English and Afrikaans Hand gestures will be used where language barriers occur.
- Documents Required: Holiday Visa is required to enter South Africa and travel insurance for participating in this program.

Timing and duration:

The volunteer program runs all year round and kicks off every Tuesday. The volunteer program mainly runs for two weeks, but can extend or shorten through prior arrangement.



Location:

Buffelsdrift is located in South Africa (in the Western Cape) approximately 6, 5 km outside the village of Oudtshoorn on route to the Cango Caves. This area is called the Klein Karoo. The farm is within a 60 minute drive of the popular area referred to as the Garden route and has an added benefit that it is a malaria free area.

Which airport do I fly to? You can fly to George National Airport from Cape Town or from Johannesburg. There you will be picked up on selected days and transported along the 60 minute scenic drive to Buffelsdrift..

Accommodation:

Accommodation is provided in a large tented camp with up to four people (same gender) per tent. The accommodation is basic, but the single beds are comfortable with bedding provided (duvets and pillows). Showers and toilet facilities are onsuite.. Power sockets for electrical items are available in each tent and in the communal area. Volunteers also have access to Wi-Fi in the tented camp. The daily meals are prepared by a staff member assisted by the volunteers.

What is included?

- Transfer to and from George on Tuesdays
- Accommodation
- Breakfast, lunch and dinner
- Support and assistance from program coordinator
- Foundation t-shirt

What's not included?

- All flights
- Visas
- Personal travel insurance
- Optional extra activities
